Choice Teacher's Notes

Video Choice

1. Put students in groups of three and dictate these words and phrases to them.

good	first	multiple	the right
the wrong	wide	make a	be faced with a difficult

- 2. They work together to think of one noun that collocates with all the words and phrases. (Answer: choice)
- 3. Now give them a couple of minutes to think of ways they can use these collocations in a conversation. e.g. they could talk about a time when they (or someone they know) were faced with a difficult choice or tell the group about a restaurant with a wide choice of dishes etc.
- 4. Once they've had some thinking time, they start talking to their groups. Round it off by asking which collocations were used and, briefly, the context.
- 5. Tell students that they're going to watch a video called *Choice*. Put them in A/B pairs sitting back to back, with A facing the screen. Turn the sound off. Tell students that you're going to play a clip and Student A is going to describe to B what they can see on the screen while it's happening make sure your instructions are clear and that students know they have to give a running commentary. Tell A that if they don't know the word for something, they have to find another way to say it.
- 6. Play the clip from the 00:08 to 01:27 and A tells B what they can see. Afterwards, everyone watches the clip no sound yet and notes down vocabulary to ask about it. B tells A how good their description was and then everyone asks vocabulary questions. (You could tell the class that they must ask a minimum number questions, e.g. 6 or 8, before moving on.)
- 7. Repeat step 5, this time with B facing the screen and describing to A. Play from 01:27 to 02:43.
- 8. Ask the students where and why they think the video was made. (Mozambique and South Africa / the film is a reflection of the filmmaker's thoughts and emotions during this holiday. Don't tell the students yet that he asked his girlfriend to marry him.)
- 9. Display (or give students a copy of) the gapped script on page 2. Let them read it and check / ask about new vocabulary.
- 10. Display (or dictate) the words on page 3. Students have to decide where they go in the text and change the form of each word so that it fits. Once they've finished, ask them what choice they think the filmmaker is talking about in the last line.
- 11. Now watch the video with sound so that students can check their answers to the gap fill and see if their predictions were correct.
- 12. If you want to continue talking about choice, there are lots of questions on this page.
